

Shelli's Space

As the Strategic Planning Team has been doing our work, we have recently been analyzing our current situation in terms of our governance structure, our programming, our finances, our staffing situation, our operations, and our external landscape. As I type, we're finishing up our analysis of our operations, which will bring us to our last category in Phase 2. We plan to share the results with Church Council on May 8th, and with the entire congregation on June 2nd.

One of the things that has arisen as part of the analysis of our staffing situation is that "The senior pastor is currently able to provide for the congregation's most pressing pastoral care needs, but routine check-ins, extended pastoral care visits, and preventative pastoral care do not typically fit into the current limitations of the senior pastor's calendar." We could wait to address this need until the Strategic Planning process is concluded near the end of this calendar year. But is this something we might be able to address even now?

We are called by a God who cares for us and has expressed that care in the person of Jesus the Christ. The call to care is a call to each of us. In the past, we have had congregants who were trained in "Called to Care," a resource created by the UCC to help lay people become caregivers within our congregation. The dream is that "members of local churches around the country will seek to live out with renewed faithfulness Jesus' command to love one another."

Especially on the heels of our recent Mental Health Sunday, we know how important it is to reach out to those who might be isolated and those who are dealing with pain and/or suffering of various kinds. Caregiving ministries occur in hospitals, hospice, retirement communities, homes, at our church building, in one-on-one conversations, and in group settings. I wonder whether any of you might hear the call to participate in a renewal of our caregiving ministry.

If you are interested in offering caregiving visits, sending cards, making phone calls, or even facili-

tating a caregiving group (e.g. for those with mental health challenges, those who are grieving, those who are dealing with cancer, etc.), please email me at shelli@lrucc.org. We already have a small group of three volunteer caregivers, and we're hoping to expand our numbers to about twelve people to serve in this way.

The deacons and I will provide training materials, opportunities to shadow pastoral visits, and spiritual support. Thank you for prayerfully considering whether this is something you might be called to do.

Justice & Witness Action Network

Thank you to all who called and wrote postcards to Governor Youngkin in late February and early March. The issues which JWAN-VA worked on this year were the following:

- HB174 A bill to ensure that the right to marry for all Virginians is protected by law was approved by Governor Youngkin on March 8 and is effective on July 1, 2024.
- HB2/SB2 Banning future sales of assault weapons. This bill was vetoed with a statement by Governor Youngkin on March 26, and the House sustained the veto on April 17, 2024.

The Governor's veto statement:

Pursuant to Article V, Section 6, of the Constitution of Virginia, I veto House Bill 2, which creates new penalties for transferring and possessing certain firearms containing certain components.

The Constitution precludes the Commonwealth from prohibiting a broad category of firearms widely embraced for lawful purposes, such as self-defense. Despite this, certain members of the General Assembly have pursued legislation banning most contemporary semiautomatic firearms and specific ammunition-feeding devices.

Passages

The church office has received the news of the passing of Paul Haas on April 29. Paul had been a member of Little River Church and resident of Greenspring Community. Please keep Paul's sister Lys Kennedy and Paul's family in your prayers. No service information has been planned at this time. Like all Virginians, I am profoundly troubled by the occurrences of mass shootings and crimes committed with firearms. The pain and sorrow inflicted by criminals with heinous intentions are truly heart-wrenching and should not be minimized for our communities, the victims, or their families.

Virginia has some of the strictest gun laws in the country. Unfortunately, the Commonwealth has reduced penalties for criminals, contributing to violent crime. Enhancing penalties for crimes committed with firearms will reverse this trend. Our most significant gap, however, has been in our behavioral health system, which is why substantial investments in behavioral health are necessary.

That twofold approach can provide a real solution without creating outcomes that would affect law-abiding citizens and violating our constitutional rights.

Accordingly, I veto this bill.

HB1244/SB719 The bill to restrict the use of solitary confinement in Virginia prisons was vetoed by the Governor on March 27, and the House sustained the Governor's veto on April 17, 2024.

Potomac Association Revival

Love4: Love of God, Service, Church, and Neighbor Saturday, June 1

Have you heard? The Potomac Association of the United Church of Christ is holding a Revival on Saturday, June 1, from 10 A.M. to 4 P.M. at Peoples Congregational UCC (4704 13th Street, NW, Washington, DC). The day is a celebration of our covenant with other area UCC churches, and its theme is Love4: Love of God, Service, Church, and Neighbor.



The event includes a wonderful opportunity to hear from our new General Minister and President, Karen Georgia Thompson, who will preach during the Potomac Association's worship service. The Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson is the first woman, and the first Black woman, to lead the denomination. She was elected by the General Synod at its July 2023 meeting. Rev. Thompson is the third

woman nominated for the post, after the Revs. Yvonne Delk (in 1989) and Barbara Brown Zikmund (in 1999), but the first to be elected.

A Jamaican immigrant, Thompson is the third person of African descent to serve as leader of the denomination.

Pastor Shelli will offer a workshop during the event, from 11 to 11:45 A.M. And there will be plenty of other workshops to choose from as well! More details are forthcoming.

Fair Trade


Sunday, May 19

LRUCC Book Group in May will be presented by the Women's Ministry and supported by our Antiracism Ministry. We will discuss *Hollywatts*, the memoir of our former interim pastor, the Rev. Dr. Arthur L. Cribbs, Jr. He describes the journey his family took from the segregated life in Memphis to a new life in Southern California, seeking a better life that

his parents wanted for the family. Seven years after graduating from high school the author returns to see a dramatically changed Watts. Guns, gangs, and drugs completely transformed his childhood home, a change that Pastor Art describes as orchestrated.

Our discussion will center on the life of the Cribbs family and the possible sources of the changes the author describes. As a very special guest, the author himself, Pastor Art, will be joining the Book Group discussion from the west coast!

Board of Trustees Update

Invasive Vine Removal

On April 27, the Board of Trustees scheduled an Invasive Vine Removal work session. This was the first of several work sessions that will be scheduled over the next six months. There will be plenty of upcoming opportunities to get involved. Volunteer labor counts as \$29.95 per hour towards LRUCC's \$1,500 cost share for the Tree Planting and Preservation Fund (TPPF) 2024 mini-grant of \$3,000 for invasive vine removal.

The focus for April 27 was on the front entrance to the church driveway and around the church cross and sign on Little River Turnpike. Geoff Carpenter and Robin Petrusak dug out Japanese honeysuckle, English ivy and porce-

lain berry vines from around the church sign and the on the left side of the driveway entrance. We discovered that the left side of the driveway has at least four azaleas that are being smothered by invasive vines, but were nevertheless trying to bloom. We made some headway with uncovering the azaleas, but there remains plenty of work to be done along the top of the driveway.

Please consider helping out at the next Invasive Vines Removal work session to be scheduled by the Board of Trustees. Fresh air, exercise, and no experience necessary, other than gardening and weeding in general. Someone will show you what plants to look for and you will quickly learn to identify the most common "invaders."


Building Ties with Germany
